

Tembo, the blackback of the Makumba gorilla group in Bai Hokou has started spending more time away from the group. This month he was absent from the group for a week but came back. He is almost 14 years old and our experience with three other blackbacks show that he has reached the time to leave the group. Tembo, born in December 2007 was the first western lowland birth to be observed in the wild. He was born in the presence of tourists and the tracking team has observed him grow from an infant to a sub-adult.

Three members of the Elephant Listening Project team from Nouabalé Ndoki National Park in Congo visited DSPA to train our team on the installation and maintenance of acoustic recorders. The Dzanga Elephant Project team at Dzanga bai participated in the training together with our ecological monitoring team and some ecoguards. A total of 12 people were trained.

We officially launched a project titled "Community-based reforestation of degraded areas of the Bayanga agriculture zone in DSPA". This project which started in May 2021 and aims to restore 40 Ha of degraded lands will be headed by the local NGO Maison de l'Enfant et de la femme Pygmée (MEFP). This month MEFP mobilized 12 community members (divided into four teams, each headed by a woman) to complete the work on the community tree nursery that will produce at least 20,000 seedlings of important plant species which are multi-use and fast growing as well as have the capacity to contribute to the restoration of soil fertility

We also used a community approach to maintain the old 20 Ha reforestation plot. The Bayanga youths association mobilized 100 youths to do the job

Dzanga bai data: based on the number counted every 30 minutes between 12:00 to 16:30 each day of the month.

Note that there were 2 instances with zero elephant in the bai; first during the autopsy of an elephant carcass and the second when there was a loud thunder during a storm that caused elephants to take refuge in the forest.

Discover the Biodiversity of the DSPA

The black crake (*Zapornia flavirostra*) is a waterbird. It breeds in most of sub-Saharan Africa except in very arid areas.

The adult black crake is 19–23 cm long with a short tail and long toes. As its name implies, the adult has mainly black plumage, with a brown olive tone on the wings and upperparts which is rarely detectable in the field. The eye is red, the bill is yellow and the legs and feet are red, duller when not breeding. The sexes are similar, but the male is slightly larger.

The habitat is freshwater marshes of all types, as long as there is some vegetation to provide cover.

The black crake is extremely aggressive when breeding and will attack birds of many species, but especially other rails

The black crake is diurnal, and eats a wide range of invertebrates, small fish, frogs and seeds.





The veterinary team carried out necropsies on two elephant carcasses observed by ecoguards in the Dzanga bai area. The first elephant who had many bruises from fighting was also victim of poaching. There was a bullet hole on the head but the tusks were still intact showing that it ran from its aggressors many kilometers away to finally die in Dzanga bai.

The second elephant was victim of aggression as it was full of bruises. Interestingly this elephant had tusks weighing 49kg

37 regular patrols and 4 binational patrols with the rangers of NNNP. In total 1,416 rangers-days, 1,724 km traveled on foot covering an area of 1,380 km². This resulted in the seizure of 9 manufactured 2-gauge shotguns and 30 gauge cartridges. In addition, 3,700 metal snares were dismantled and 105 kgs of bush meat and 1.5 kgs of pangolin scales were confiscated.

20 poachers were arrested, sensitized and released. 7 poachers are currently awaiting trial. 4 elephant tusks were recovered from two elephant carcasses found in the Park. One was poached and the other from natural causes





Community Development

On the occasion of the International Day of the World's Indigenous Peoples, August 9, this year, we organized activities to commemorate the day in Monassao, some 50 kilometers from Bayanga.

Water remains a priority for indigenous peoples and all communities. This month we carried out a mission to identify water sources within DSPA with the aim to seek efficient means to provide communities with drinking water, because water is life





Following the mobilization of 273 representatives of the Union of Ba'Aka Communities (UCB) in July, this month we helped organize the first general assembly where a new group of leaders of the union was voted and put in office. We will work closely with the newly installed office to improve collaboration with the Ba'Aka communities and to ensure their effective participation in the management of DSPA.






Tourism and Marketing


