A 39-year-old female known as Aida II (she is the first daughter of Aida's mother) was identified in 2022. Since this first observation, she has continued to frequent the clearing. Aida II was pregnant, but as there is no detailed information on pregnancy stages for elephants, predicting a birth date was not possible. Gestation in elephants lasts 22 months and data has been collected on the subject for a long time. Finally, on August 5, 2023, she was last seen in her pregnant state, and 4 months later (December 12, 2023) she returned with her newborn, a little boy.

Not only elephant newborns are recorded, but also those of other mammals at Dzanga Bai. After the latest arrival to the giant forest hog group, on 12/27 at around 4 p.m., a little buffalo was seen for the first time with the resident group. The female had been observed for several months during her pregnancy.

The Wonga group was only lost for one day this month and our teams moved on to a new stage of habituation. Rather than counting the number of contacts per day, it becomes one long period of contact where we always stay with the group. Even when they move, they are never too far away. The periods of observation, however, still remain weak, and only Bassembo is often observed for several minutes with very good visibility. There are still many charges and vocal threats but they are reducing in intensity and even Wonga is starting to be visible more often. A new individual from the group has been identified. He has a lot of marks on his face that make him look like a very old gorilla even though he must be barely three years old. He has exactly the same mark on his nose as Ebube, the female identified last month. Recently, he was even seen on the back of this female, which confirms the fact that he must be her child.

As for Makumba, everything went well until the end of the month when a major interaction with a solitary male caused us to lose the group for more than 48 hours.

During this month, the new group in Bai Hokou was found and followed for 16 days, often with several contacts on the same day. It is becoming easier for our teams to understand the sectors that this group occupies and the increase in contact with them is a good sign for the future. One female is very fearless and she could most certainly be Indolia, a female from the Mata group. This has yet to be confirmed.





The record of presence in Dzanga Bai is of 203 elephants at the same time one year ago. This month there were "only" 199.



Scientific name Coracia garrulus

English name: European Roller

Taxonomy: Class: birds

Order : Coraciiformes
Family : Coraccidae
Genus : coracias
Specie : C. garrulus



The European Roller is a fairly large, colorful bird, mainly blue with an orange-brown back, that nests in southern and eastern Europe. The entire world population winters in Africa.

Monitoring studies of European rollers have shown that birds nesting in Spain migrate across the Sahara and pass through Cameroon and the CAR before wintering in Angola and Botswana. The birds move south into the APDS region in October and return to spring migration in March. They therefore do not winter at ADPS but are passing visitors there.

The European Roller is essentially a species of open environments. We can therefore find it hunting dragonflies and other large insects in the included savannahs. In DSPA it can be found at Dzanga Bai.






Antipoaching

During the month of December, we have made considerable progress regarding our analytical capabilities. The organization Langland Conservation did send an expert that helped us to develop a powerful analytical capability which combines a range of datasets into a unified geospatial analysis platform. To achieve this Langland configured a vastly improved and highly automated system based around ArcGIS to enable our DSPA analyst to deliver powerful analytics with just a few clicks.

On Christmas Day, we have received in Bayanga our new boat and 60 HP Yamaha engine dedicated to the surveillance on the Sangha River.

December is a difficult month regarding poaching, as illegal activities increase during the holidays. This year has not been different from previous years. The ecoguards have seized a total of 21 firearms, one of them an AK 47, a weapon to kill elephants.

41 regular patrols were conducted involving 81 rangers. In total 1507 Rangers/days. 2180 km were traveled on foot to cover an area of 2407 km2.

This resulted in the seizure of 1 AK 47 magazine and 22 AK 47 ammunitions, 8 manufactured 12-gauge firearms, and 12 homemade firearms, with 108 ammunitions. 144kg of illegal wild meat and 1 kg of Pangolin scales were also seized, and 2845 metal snares were dismantled.

4 live turtles were seized and released and 2 elephant carcasses were found.





Community Conservation

More than 60 participants were present during the two days of the workshop during which speakers presented studies carried out in the APDS allowing us to understand the impact of hunting on species and ecosystems, and to be aware of the legal practices dictated by the Wildlife Code.

At the end of the workshop, groups were formed with a view to develop a program of activities for the year 2024. Activities such as "continue participatory mapping" were announced.
