Aires Protégées

A group of forest elephants is generally composed by an adult female and her dependent offspring. Phyllis IV, born in 1999 to her mother Phyllis, was observed at Dzanga Bai in 2022 with three daughters who are still with her. The juvenile females are Phyllis IV(II), the first offspring born in 2012, Phyllis IV(III), born around 2016 and Phyllis IV(IV) born around 2020.

On November 14, 2023, Phyllis IV's group was seen for their last bai visit of 2023. Their first visit of 2024 brought a surprise; they came with Phyllis IV(V) a female who was born during a few weeks of absence of the group. Phyllis IV's group is one of the biggest groups of a mother with dependent offspring, a total of four young females.

The dry season is at its peak in the protected areas of Dzanga-Sangha, making the work of our teams more difficult. The rainy season, despite its constraints, has the advantage of making the ground looser, thus favoring the increase in traces left by the gorillas behind their passages. In addition, at this time of year, the availability of fruit throughout their living space is very low, forcing the gorillas to switch to a diet mainly composed of plants and tree leaves. Despite this, our teams, accustomed to these seasonal changes, continue their efforts to habituate the new groups of gorillas.

This month, Mboga, the youngest member of the Makumba group, celebrates his first anniversary.

This new year has started with a new adventure for juvenile female Inguka, one of the twins born in the Makumba group. Her absence was noticed by tracking teams on the morning of January 5th and this was confirmed in the days that followed. Less than a hundred meters from the place where the group spent the night, we found the nests of another group, leading us to believe that this is when she left the group to join another one. It is rare to see groups of different gorillas spending a night so close to each other without the dominant males entering conflict. Was it the group of a former son of Makumba, born to another female than Malui, the mother of the twins? Did this other male pique the interest of Inguka, in order for her to leave her birth group? The conditions of Injuka's departure will remain unclear, but we wish her the best and thank her for these magnificent moments that she and her sister brought us.

Scientific name Potamocherus porcus

English name: Red river hog

Taxonomy: Class : mammalia

Order : <u>Artiodactyla</u>
Family : Suidae

Genus: Potamochoerus

Specie: P. porcus



The red river hog lives in tropical rainforests, humid savannahs, in densely forested valleys, and near rivers, lakes and swamps.

It has striking red fur, with black legs and a white line along its spine and tufts on its ears. They have white markings around the eyes and on the cheeks and jaws; the rest of the mouth and face are black

Adults weigh 45 to 115 kilograms and measure 55 to 80 centimeters in height, with a length of 100 to 145 centimeters. the males are somewhat larger than the females

These pigs eat grasses, berries, roots, insects. They usually live in herds of between 6 and 20 members led by a dominant wild boar.

40 regular patrols were conducted involving 88 rangers. In total 1801 Rangers/days. 2362 km were traveled on foot to cover an area of 2407 km2.

This resulted in the seizure of 11 manufactured 12-gauge firearms, and 6 homemade firearms, with 218 ammunitions. 819 kg of illegal wild meat were seized, and 1159 metal snares were dismantled. 2 elephant carcasses were found and 5 suspects arrested
