

# Wildlife

The Dzanga Bai is mostly frequented by adult females and their offspring, as well as by young males. However, older adult males, who generally are solitary, frequent the clearing occasionally due to the need of minerals or for sexual encounters. The largest male registered since 2021 is known as Tyrone, a tuskless very peaceful male in his 30's. But on February 13<sup>th</sup>, an even larger adult male in full musth entered the clearing. As the big tusker could not be identified from the historical database, he was given the name "Yongoro", which means "the giant".

A 64-years old female, called Gargantua, has been killed in an accident by an adult male. 14 minutes after entering the clearing, Gargantua approached the water pit where a male was extracting minerals. When she lowered her head into the water, the male pushed her with his tusks, poking her straight into the neck. Gargantua immediately fell to the ground and bled out in a matter of a few hours. It is common for elephants to slightly aggress each other to defend the water pit that they occupy, and we believe that Gargantua's death sentence was the unfortunate posture that she was in when the attacked occurred, combined with the pointy tusks of a strong aggressor and her slow reaction time due to her advanced age. Gargantua has been registered in the database for the first time in 1994 and has never been seen with offspring. Her tusks were recovered by the law enforcement department some days later.

While red river hogs are commonly seen during the nighttime, observations in pure day light are rare, and do normally not comprise more than one or two individuals. In February, a group of 13 hogs entered the clearing in the middle of the day and spend a few minutes foraging on the edges. Due to the number of individuals present we believe that it is the same group that visits the clearing during the night.

# Discover the Biodiversity of the DSPA

Scientific name Lophocerus fasciatu

**English name:** African pied hornbill

*Taxonomy*: Class : birds

Order : bucerotiformes
Family : Bucerotidae
Genus : Lophoceros
Specie : L.. fasciatu



The African pied hornbill is a common resident breeder in much of equatorial Africa. It is a large bird, reaching 54 centimeters, and has mainly black plumage, with a white belly and tail tip. The long, curved black and yellow bill has a medium-sized casque.

Both genders have a similar size, but the females have smaller casques. Immature birds are duller, have a smaller bill, and no casque. The flight of this species is described as undulating.

The African pied hornbill is mainly found in forested habitats, and it is omnivorous, eating fruits and insects.

The female lays up to four white eggs in a tree hole which is blocked off during incubation with a cement made of mud, droppings and fruit pulp. There is only one narrow aperture, big enough for the male to transfer food to the mother and the chicks.





#### Antipoaching

This month we have lost a gorilla to a gunshot, for the first time that we know of in over 10 years. It was a silverback, and we don't know exactly what could have happened, since the gorilla was intact when we discovered it. But he certainly was killed by a bullet.

On the other hand, Armand Mozengha, an ecoguard who had been working at DS since 2010, has died due to a sudden illness.

40 regular patrols were conducted involving 88 rangers. In total 1597 Rangers/days. 1.840km were traveled on foot.

This resulted in the seizure of 5 manufactured 12-gauge firearms, and 8 homemade firearms, with 66 ammunitions. 52 kg of illegal wild meat were seized, and 1133 metal snares were dismantled. 1 elephant carcass was found and 2 suspects arrested.

#### Community Conservation

On the 9th of February, a delegation from the long-term One Health partner, the German Helmholtz Institute for One Health (HIOH), arrived in Bayanga. The purpose of their visit was for all department heads to get to know the field site better, to introduce the long-term One Health projects to the community, and strengthen collaboration with local partners in both Bangui and Dzanga Sangha. The visiting HIOH team encompasses various disciplines, ranging from pathogen evolution and antimicrobial resistance to the ecology and emergence of zoonotic pathogens. Additionally, Josef Penninger, the scientific director of the Helmholtz Centre for Infection Research in Germany, which oversees HIOH, visited to witness the research firsthand. He gave his full dedication and support to HIOH's research endeavors, alongside WWF CAR and DSPA, for future collaborations on One Health related projects.

Dr. Marie Noël Mbaikoua, head of veterinary services at the Ministry of Livestock in Bangui, and Dr. Clotaire Rafaï, director of the National Lab in Bangui, joined the field visit to Bayanga to familiarize themselves with the research and work conducted both in the forest and the laboratory there.

Nine clubs participated, and a tenth team, comprised of HIOH researchers kindly helped by local star players, also competed. After several rounds, DIAMANT SPORT emerged as the tournament's champion. Additionally, on the 13<sup>th</sup> of February a workshop was organized to inform the representatives of the different villages of DSPA about the One Health surveillance plans and giving the opportunity for the audience to pose interesting questions on health-related subjects to the HIOH team.
