We confirm the presence of 11 regularly observed individuals in the Limo gorilla group: the silverback Limo, the females Indolia, Wusa, Mpokapoka and Payo from the Mata group, the female Mopatapata from the Makumba group (which she left in 2006) and another female currently being identified. All individuals are on different levels of habituation. Indolia, Wusa, Mpokapoka and the unnamed female all have babies. The group is contacted on a regular basis, and continuing like this means that next year we might be able to open the group to tourism.

STE V is an adult female born around 1976, reidentified in 2022 and who visits the clearing often. Until recently she had always been seen with an intact tail, but in October, after spending several months in the forest, she arrived to the clearing missing a piece of her tail. In forest elephants, a cut tail can be a consequence of an injury caused by vegetation, an attack or an infection.

This month we had two newborns at Dzanga Bai. The adult female named Creusa (49 years of age) had been seen showing signs of pregnancy in July 2024. Three months later (October 23rd, 2024) she returned to the clearing with her newborn, a little male.

On October $3^{\rm rd}$ an adult female from the buffalo group that often frequents the bai came with a newborn.





In the past months, we observed an increase in the number of elephants killed by poaching. Following an investigation in the area, we discovered a network that was supplying war weapons to the population to kill elephants. The members of this network have been arrested and brought to justice.

This month, we have not found any elephant carcasses.

As part of the capacity building of our field teams, a leadership training dedicated to Team Leaders and Assistants began in October. This program aims to develop the leadership, team management and decision-making skills of 14 Rangers. This training is provided by our long-term partner Chengeta Wildlife.

32 regular patrols were conducted involving 80 rangers. In total 1.277 rangers/days. 1.750 km were traveled on foot

This resulted in the seizure of 12 manufactured 12-gauge firearms, and 8 homemade firearms.

56 kg of illegal wild meat were seized, and 3.186 metal snares were dismantled.

No elephant carcasses were found.

10 suspects of poaching activity were arrested.





Community Conservation

For this school year (2024-2025), the APDS produced personalized notebooks that are currently being distributed to all students in the 32 schools bordering the APDS, including a middle school and a high school. A major donation of school supplies including the 31,000 personalized APDS notebooks, backpacks, books, slates, pens, academic boxes and other school utensils are currently being distributed to all students of the APDS.

In collaboration with the Union of Ba'aka Communities (UCB) we organized a campaign for the extraction of jiggers from Ba'aka children. A total of 214 children were treated.

Discussions took place with the administration, the MEFP, Radio Njokou, and Ndimakali to set up an effective strategy to raise awareness for the eradication of this scourge in the Ba'aka environment.
